With a history that traces back to the Arawak Indians coming from South America "about the time of the first Christmas," pineapples were called Boniama or Yayama and "believed to be food for the Gods. "The Antigua variety of pineapple is known as the "Black". And it is described as having a dark green color when it is most delicious, but is smaller than other commercial types. This variety ripens to agolden glow. It is juicy, sweet, and full of flavor. A tasty wine was made from the fruits and pineapples.

Congratulations to the people of Antigua and Barbuda on the 40th Anniversary of Independence!

The country which our ancestors began reinventing, after defeating colonialism, differs remarkably from the sparse building blocks inherited on 1st November 1981. Those forty years until the present have been a marvelous experiment; the people and government created a better life for the citizens and residents through innovation, courage, and resilience.

For a colonial outpost, peopled and economically designed purposefully to extract wealth for absentee owners, beginning nearly four centuries ago, the relatively short period of sovereignty demonstrates collective brilliance. Our people have been yearning for the opportunities to manage their own affairs and to express their nationhood by astute leadership. The evidence demonstrates that the political maturity and social cohesion displayed during the forty years of independence are highly-valued behaviours that have become deeply ingrained in the sovereign consciousness of the people of Antigua and Barbuda.

There have been 16 general elections since 1946, when political parties first emerged. Never has there been a resort to violence or to force, in order to change the outcomes of those democratic expressions. In the eight general elections since 1981, governments have been changed with power passing from one political party to another, no violence or disturbance. Political maturity and social cohesion have been at work. Our cultural traditions, including the annual Carnival and the Christmas celebrations, enrich and

bind our people. These celebrations allow for all other incidental identities to be submerged temporarily, even as competition for excellence shines through. Our people have learned, through Christian values and socialization, to be tolerant and patient with each other.

The novel Coronavirus disease, or the Covid-19, the resulting vaccines that prevent hospitalization and death, and the securing of a sufficient supply of those vaccines now approved, have tested every country's people, worldwide. In Antigua and Barbuda's case, sufficiency of supply of the vaccines has been achieved. Yet, a significant cadre of our people seem determined to challenge the nation's leadership and to remain unvaccinated. This disagreement in the 40th year of Independence is surprising. Achieving national immunity will, nevertheless, continue as a national ambition. I am confident that our people will triumph over Covid and restore normalcy, good health, and prosperity for future generations.

I congratulate the people of Antigua and Barbuda for forty years of excellence, and I promise to take our country forward in the years ahead, turning the nation into an Economic Powerhouse.

Long live Antigua and Barbuda! Long live our people! Long live sovereignty!



Dame Ruby Beryl Nivla Lake Richards
(MD. FRCS-psych)

Today we celebrate the life and work of Dr. Ruby Lake-Richards a 99-year-old Antiguan for her outstanding accomplishments as a medical professional. She was part of the inaugural class of medical students at the University of the West Indies (UWI) and is the first female graduate from Antigua and Barbuda and the only surviving alumni.

In 1948, Dr. Lake was one of 33 students from across the Caribbean region who registered to study Medicine at the then University College of the West Indies (UCWI) she was one of 10 women and one of only two students from Antigua & Barbuda in what was the first faculty of the institution.

She received her medical degree from the UCWI in 1954 and interned at the Holberton Hospital in St John's, Antigua. She then worked as a parish doctor at the Carty's Hill's Clinic in Glanvilles where she also established a private practice. In 1967, Dr. Lake Richards migrated to Montreal, with her husband, the late Sir Novelle Richards who was appointed by the governments of the Eastern Caribbean countries to be the first Diplomatic Trade Commissioner to Canada.

In Montreal she did postgraduate studies at Mc Gill University in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry while also working at the Reddy Memorial Hospital and the Montreal Children's Hospital.

In 1977, she received her Fellowship in the Royal college of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and with it recognition "by the public and the entire health community as proof of her world-class expertise.

Dr. Lake Richards' medical career spanned well over 60 years, four decades of which was spent here in Montreal at the Douglas Hospital. She retired in 2015 at age 93.

On Saturday July 31, Dr Lake-Richards who resides in Montreal received an Honorary Doctor of Science degree from UWI to mark her lifetime contribution to the field. The ceremony was held at the Five Islands Campus of UWI that was recently opened In Antigua & Barbuda.

In tribute to Dr. Lake-Richards, Pro-Vice Chancellor and Principal of the UWI Five Islands campus, Professor Williams Densil Williams noted, "Being an Antiguan and being honored by the youngest campus in the UWI system, domiciled in her country of birth is special and even more so that she is alive and in good health to receive this accolade from her alma mater."

Following the recommendation from the prime minister of Antigua & Barbuda, The Hon. Gaston Browne, on November 1, 2021 the title of Damehood "which is the most senior honor in the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire" was bestowed upon her for her exemplary contributions to medicine

Today, November 20, 2021, The Antigua & Barbuda Association of Montreal is privileged to recognize a professional who has worked in our community and has positively touched the lives of family members and friends whom we know. We thank her for her stellar legacy.

It is our distinct honor to recognize and pay tribute to Dame Ruby Lake Richards for her distinguished accomplishments and service as a medical professional.

To keep Antigua in unity.


Falcona Henry.

After she graduated from school She went to the Antigua Technical College where she did a three year program in Hotel and Catering and worked for a short while in Antigua in the Hotel industry.

Falcona immigrated to Montreal in 1978 and worked for a couple of families but did not find it easy. She emphasized that she did not tolerate any form of abuse from those families. She later worked in a C S H L D for 23 years until it eventually it closed in 2010. Falcona also worked in a community center near home and found the experience rewarding. There she was able to mentor several children and young adults who came to the centre. She is now retired and is enjoying this new life immensely.

The Lord has blessed her with two beautiful children Curran and Courtney Connor. She says they have taught her a lot and that she is still learning. Many, many years ago, Falcona developed a love for poetry and has been writing ever since. She hopes that one day she will be able to publish all of her poems. Falcona also loves to pray also and says it's the only weapon that guides me her life's journey. She extends thanks to the Antigua and Barbuda Association for this honour and prays that as Antiguans and Barbudans, we may work together for the development of our beautiful country and be blessed by our efforts.



Fernando Smith was born and raised in Freeman's Village Antigua. He now resides in Toronto, Canada.

He is a Political Science graduate of York University with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He is passionate about community social justice. This passion led him to serve as President and Treasurer of the Antigua and Barbuda Association in Canada.

At an early age he developed a keen interest in the history of Antigua and Barbuda after listening to stories told by his late grandfather Pappa Sammy. As a result, he co-authored two books "To shoot Hard Labour 1 & 2" with his brother the late Sir Keithlyn Smith. Fernando is the recipient of many awards including A UNESCO Honour Award in 2004 for Outstanding Contribution to The Improvement Of Literacy And The Development Of The Literary Arts in Antigua And Barbuda.





The late Ada Moore was one of many Antiguan domestic workers who arrived in Canada in 1959 and spent her first year in Calgary. She later moved to Montreal, contacted other Antiguans who were living hereand some years later, in 1970 was one of the founders of the Antigua & Barbuda Association.

Over the years, Miss More was quite vocal in matters related to the Association as well as Antigua and Barbuda. Her continuous service was priceless to our community. During her service as member of the Executive, we recall her laughter and the sense of humour with which she often summoned us to action. Miss Moore was dedicated, hardworking and always saw the glass as half full. As a founding member and pillar of the Association, in 1997, Miss Moore was made a life time Honourary member for her contributions. For this exemplary volunteer service to the Antigua and Barbuda Association, tonight, we are pleased ask her niece Elaine Thomas to make presentation to two deserving students in her memory. The scholarship is awarded to students of Antiguan and Barbudan parentage with high academic achievement who intend to pursue programs at the college level.

Courtney is a graduate of Lakeshore High School in Lachine Montreal and was heavily involved in the leadership program. She spent countless hours dedicating herself to fundraising, planning school activities and variety shows. She really enjoyed every minute of her service, including being a basketball athlete. Currently, she is a volunteer coach with the leadership basketball program, a non-profit organization in La Salle. The Founder and president of Leadership Basketball club and a teacher in the community school has known Courtney for over 10 years. She worked with him helping at risk kids to become successful.

She is described as person whom the youths could trust and ask for advice. She is currently volunteering with youths age 12 and under. We are told that her calm tone makes the kids comfortable while her organization skills keep them engaged. She has been nothing but committed, responsible and have always acted in a professional manner.

Courtney's bio tells of her intense volunteer experience with at risk youths and the commitment she has made to adapt and work with students with a variety of needs. As an Integration aide within the Lester B Pearson, she loves working in a school environment helping to make a positive impact on the lives of our future generation. In her own words Courtney says that "I have recently decided to go back to school taking program that will allow me to obtain a diploma in Special Care Counseling at Vanier College. This program teaches how to work with people with physical, cognitive, intellectual, neurological, emotional as well as behavioural needs. I have a strong desire to helping others and I believe that this program will further educate and help me work with people from all different walks of life. This will be beneficial to my current line of work as well as my community."

Olarinetist Michael Maxwell

Clarinetist Michael Maxwell currently calls Ottawa his home but he is Jamaican born and received most of his training in Montreal. It all started in church at age 8 on the drums, playing with much older musicians. He eventually became an accomplished gospel musician and from a teen has taught many aspiring musicians in this tradition. He started the clarinet in high school then went on to study at the Conservatoire du Music de Montreal then at McGill University. Since those early years Michael has been performing in churches, public events and the concert hall. He recently played at the inaugural concert of the Ensemble Obiora which is dedicated to promoting black and diverse classical musicians.

sports, he and his wife Hazel are blessed with a large family.

Mrs Joan Gomes was a stalwart of the Antigua & Barbuda Association of Montreal and led us as President into an exciting celebration of our first Independence. She grew up in Freemans Village, Antigua and taught at her alma mater The Convent School/Christ The King High School.



She was also a Red Cross community volunteer - both in Antigua and Barbuda and a First-Aid instructor. She migrated to Canada in 1972 and settled in Montreal, where she continued in her career as an educator working as a lecturer at Excelsior Business College and as a teacher in The Adult Education sector of the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal. Mrs Gomes served this community well. Her commitment to the success of youth and older folks was boundless.

Her tenure as president of Antigua & Barbuda Association of Montreal and leading us into our inaugural independence celebration is one of the highlights of the organization, serving at a time when she could rely on the advice and leadership of our own Eastern Caribbean High Commissioner, the late Sir Novelle Richards. Also, she served at a time when nationals were anxious to keep their links with the

She also volunteered extensively for many years here in Montreal with seniors, engaging them with drama among other social and creative activities. In marking the first Independence celebration of Antigua and Barbuda, she worked closely with vice president Leonard Jarvis and together they were instrumental in producing a memorable Souvenir Booklet for the occasion.

The enthusiasm and passion Mrs Gomes exhibited for her work with the organization was extraordinary. Her easy laughter, her diligence for work and her frank communication skills were traits that served her well during her tenure. She pioneered an era when our folklore and traditions were always highlighted, and ensured that our connections to our roots would not be forgotten.

Mrs Gomes loved Antigua and Barbuda, and helped members of the local association maintain link with family and friends in the home country. She often lamented that she missed the island's sun and sea and dreamed of returning, which she did in 1987. Back home, she worked as Chief Welfare Officer in the government of Antigua and Barbuda. Also, she returned to volunteer work - both in Antigua and Barbuda with the Red Cross. Upon retirement, she became even more involved in her work serving as a community project manager with the Red Cross. For her commitment she received several national awards both from the Red Cross and the government of Antigua and Barbuda. Her legacy 40 years later shines brightly in our midst.

He was seconded to the West India Regiment of Jamaica in 1959 where he served for three and a half years followed by another seven and a half years in Trinidad. He is legendary for keeping in touch with his counterparts in the other islands and travels often to their reunions. In 2009, on the 50th Anniversary of the West India Regiment, Mr. Benjamin was awarded a Certificate of Recognition for being the first person of Antigua and Barbuda enlisted in the West India Regiment with an inscription, The Antigua and Barbuda Defence Force will from Henceforth Award the Best Recruit the WIF Private Sylvester Benjamin Award. It was his honour to present the first award in 2010.Mr. Benjamin settled in Montreal in 1969 and was involved in the shipping business. For many years nationals from the islands throughout the Caribbean depended on his services. He is regarded as the founder of the Antigua & Barbuda Association of Montreal. It was under his leadership in 1970 that a group of loyal nationals who wanted to keep the familial bond of the country joined him 51 years ago to inaugurate the Association. It was a safe place of belonging, of friendship and challenges with a goal to stay committed to helping each other. From 1981 to the present time, he has been an active member of the Independent United Order of Mechanics. With his title of Grand Tyler, he honed strong leadership skills. If the there is a character trait that fits Mr. Benjamin it is resilience. Throughout his 11-year term as President of the Antigua & Barbuda Association, he held the fort when others felt the burden with leadership. He was always determined to keep nationals engaged and united. Giving up was not an option for him. He gave of his time and energy to ensure that the Association reached out with events and activities that included other members of the Caribbean community. One of his strengths was that of his keeping the nationals of Montreal connected to those in other areas of North America. The groundwork in committed leadership that he encouraged is testament to the survival of the Association today. For his service we are truly grateful.

EARLY ANTIGUANS



Reverend Charles Este

For 45 years Rev. Dr. Charles Este served as the spiritual leader of the flock at Union United Located at 3007 Delisle, and forged his outreach work extending throughout the community, helping Black in Montreal and newcomers, in areas of employment, housing, immigration and other social issues.



Dr. Este was raised in the village of Jennings in St Mary's Parish, Antigua. He attended Cedar Hall School and worshipped with his family at the building next door, the Cedar Hall Moravian Church. His family later moved to St. John's and continued their spiritual journey in the Seventh-Day Adventist Church. He emigrated from Antigua in 1913 to further his education. His ministry at Union United Church one Canada's oldest Black congregations began in 1925 and extended to 1968. Throughout his tenure, Rev. Dr. Este was indefatigable in advocating on behalf of members of his congregation as well as members of the the Anglophone community, and indeed marginalized people across Montreal. His social justice advocacy and his focus on the literary arts exemplified is status as a formidable community builder. Among his many standout achievements and contributions are his efforts in establishing the Negro Community Center, an organization that later bore his name. The Center was established in 1927 under his leadership as Pastor of Union United Church and was located in several neighbourhood spaces in Little Burgundy before it was moved to the basement of Union United Church, in 1930 then to its long-standing location at Coursol Street in 1955. In its heyday the Negro Community Centre (The Charles Este Center) was a foundational spot for Quebec's Black and Caribbean community offering range of programs that included health and welfare services as well as activities that facilitated the educational and recreational needs of children, youth and adults in the Montreal and surrounding areas. Under the good guidance of Rev. Dr. Este, the Centre as it was known, grew to be not only a gathering place but also that nurtured and enhance the lives of the families that it served. The building that housed the Centre was demolished in 2014 and efforts are still at play for its revitalization. His work in establishing and maintaining the Centre as well as his spiritual leadership at Union United Church, earned Rev. Dr. Charles Este legendary status not only in the Black community but across Montreal. His name evokes pride and his formidable legacy of service will live on. For that we honour and celebrate him



Sir Novelle Hamilton Richards


Sir Novelle Hamilton Richards, (K.C.G.N.) was a distinguished author, statesman and politician who represented the Leeward Islands and Antigua and Barbuda, both at home and abroad. He was born in the historic village of Liberta, Antigua. He attended the Grace Hill School, the Antigua Grammar School and the London Polytechnic Institute in England where he successfully pursued a Diploma Course in Journalism. Sir Novelle Richards He was first elected to the Antigua Legislative Council in 1951, representing the St. John's Rural South (1951-60) for the Antigua labour Party. In 1958 he was elected as a member Federal Parliament of the West Indies Federationand served as a member of the Federal Cabinet and acted as Federal Prime Minister on several occasions. Following Antigua's declaration of Independence from Great Britain in 1967.

Sir Novelle was elected the first President of the Antigua and Barbuda Senate later that year. He was appointed by the governments of the Eastern Caribbean to serve in Montreal as the First Diplomatic Trade Commissioner in Canada. Antiguans have always been proud of the contributions of Sir Novelle Richards to our government and the life and progress of the people of the twin islands. In addition to being the author of several publications including Tropic Gems, Twilight Hour and Vines of Freedom, one of his most significant contributions is having composed the lyrics of the National Anthem of Antigua and Barbuda. Members of the Antigua Barbuda Association of Montreal remember and acknowledge the formidable legacy of Sir Novelle Richards. As well as his lasting inspiration for success. As we celebrate his stellar statesmanship and reflect on his service, we remember his message of encouragement to us at our first Independence celebration some 40 years ago and it continues resonates today. His legacy to all Antiguans and Barbudans everywhere is indelibly etched in our lives.

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

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


Winston Bell was born in the village of Cedar Grove in Antigua and had been an active member of the Antigua and Barbuda Association for many years.

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Antigua and Barbuda Unbounded Beauty and Stability

Today Antigua and Barbuda, a country of about 100,000 people stands as a stable and solid democratic state built on a foundation of education and a fledgling and diverse economy that revolves around tourism, investment banking

and financial services and what has been described as "enclave-type" manufacturing. Antigua is 108 square miles located in the eastern Caribbean Barbuda is 62 sq miles and stands 30 miles north of Antigua. The twin-island state which gained its independence from Britain, 40 years ago on November 1981 was guided politically by Vere Cornwall Bird as its first Prime Minister.

Today, Antigua and Barbuda is a constitutional monarchy with a parliamentary form of government. Executive power is vested in a Council of Ministers headed by the prime minister in the person of

The Hon. Gaston Browne. His Excellency Sir Rodney Williams serves as Governor-General.

The country's history on education is sound. Antigua's early schools were started by the Moravian church leaders and the island was the location for the only Teachers college in the Leeward Islands. Today education is free and compulsory for students of primary and secondary school and is seen as the foundation and the strength of success for the youth. There are three colleges and two universities located in Antigua and Barbuda. College level education is often referred to as 'Tertiary Education.


The majority of the population is of African descent and speak English, most of whom live in and around the capital city of St. John's.

The country history was built on various forms of exploration and exploitation by various European powers. Antigua was first visited in 1493 by Christopher Columbus,


who named it for the Church of Santa Maria de la Antigua in Sevilla, Spain. It was colonized by English settlers in 1634 and raided by the French in 1666 but remained a British possession. The early colonizers were also attacked by the indigenous Carib warriors who were once one of the dominant peoples of the West Indies. With an early plantation economy fueled by slave labour, tobacco was the crop of choice first grown in Antigua, but in the later 17th century, sugar was found to be more profitable. Barbuda history is even more sordid, when the country was used by one of Britain's powerful financiers, the Codrington family as a breeding ground for slaves to work on their plantation in Antigua.

Antigua was the first English speaking Caribbean Island to receive full emancipation for its slaves on August 1, 1834. Barbuda was not yet a part of Antigua.

Although Antigua and Barbuda's flourishing tourist economy has been decimated by Covid-19, the country remains one of the region's most attractive spots for visitors with 365 crystal clear beaches and interesting island attractions.

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
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
